#### Marie writes-

As we enter the season of Advent – a time of preparation and waiting for the celebration of Christmas, I am often drawn to thinking about Mary. I wonder what it was actually like for Mary as she prepared to bring a special baby into the world. I think the reality of Mary's experience was probably not as rosy as nativity Christmas card pictures depict. She was only a young lady when she had




the shock of the visit from an angel with news from God. As news goes, being told that you're going to have a virgin birth and the child you will bear will be the Son of God is pretty big news! Most teenagers, including me at that age, would have run a mile. But not Mary! "Here am I, the servant of the Lord; let it be with me according to your word", Mary says to the angel Gabriel. How extraordinary! What faith and obedience Mary had. I wonder if she really understood the task ahead. Did she really know the reality of what was about to happen?

The reality of Jesus' birth is not really the sanitised version of the story that the Gospel writers write about. The Holy family were away from their home. They had travelled for days on foot and would have been exhausted. There must've been a level of anxiety that comes with the weight of responsibility of carrying and delivering the holy child. There

were no medical interventions – no pain relief, no clean sheets or towels. It was cold and dark. The gospels don't tell us how long Mary laboured for – or who cleaned up the mess after the birth. There's no mention of how sore she was afterwards, of cracked nipples or any of the other realities of giving birth to a child. And we sing at Christmas time about the little Lord Jesus – no crying he makes. But all baby's cry! Mostly in the middle of the night, so there would have been very little chance for Mary and Joseph to lay down their sweet heads! The reality of the birth of the Christchild is that it was a messy affair. And that messiness, confusion, anxiety and pain is a reflection of our world and of our lives.

One of the names for Jesus, which we use quite often especially at Christmas time is Emmanuel. The name Emmanuel is a masculine name of Hebrew origin that means "God is with us". Emmanuel is definitely worth celebrating at Christmas time and throughout the year, because at the heart of the nativity is the message that God is



with us in the middle of the messiness, noise and pain of our lives. So, however you spend your Christmas know that God is with you; and that through the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus, God knows what it is to be human.

There is plenty of opportunity to come along to a service or activity at St. Alban's during Advent and Christmas.

We will be joining our Christian sisters and brothers from Dialstone Lane Methodist Church, GLO church and St. Philip's and St. Peter's on Monday evenings during advent from 7.30pm in the Strawberry Gardens pub. We'll be looking at

Paula Gooder's book 'Women of the Nativity'. All are welcome – do join us if you are able to.

Christmas Messy Church, for families of all ages is on

Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> December at 3.30pm and the Albany Carol service is Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> December at 6pm. On Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> December we'll be singing carols at Offerton ALDI

and at Lisburne Court. Our carol service is on Sunday 15<sup>th</sup> December at 4pm where you are invited to come along dressed as a character from the nativity story. For those of us who find Christmas a difficult time because we miss a loved one, we have our lovely Blue Christmas service on Thursday 19<sup>th</sup> December at 7pm. Our friends



from Memories Funeral service will kindly provide the refreshments. Our ever-popular Christingle service is on Christmas Eve at 4pm, followed by Midnight communion at 11.30pm and on Christmas Day there will be a short service of holy communion at 9am. Here are some of the cuter creatures considered to be the UK's most endangered animals ----- Countryfile 2024



The **Scottish wildcat** is the only feline species native to the British Isles, the wildcat was once widespread, but is now restricted to northern Scotland where as few

as 100 may remain

The **Red squirrel** has been in decline since the early 20th century and has dwindled to an estimated population of only 140,000. Only commonly found in the far north of England and Scotland.





The **Hazel Dormouse** has a great fondness for sleep, the hazel dormouse spends half of the year in hibernation. They are small, the body measuring 75mm with a 65mm tail, and have golden-brown fur with large, round black eyes.

Once a familiar summer sound, the 'purr' of the **Turtle Dove** is now rarely heard in Britain. In fact, in 2022 a survey suggested they were the fasting declining species in the UK. They have declined by 99% in Britian since 1960, due in part to widespread hunting across the Mediterranean as they migrate from Africa.



Let's hope their numbers increase and they are no longer endangered.

#### 17th December -

#### **Eglantyne Jebb founder of Save the Children**



Here is a modern-day saint whose compassion and determination has saved literally millions of lives.

Eglantyne Jebb did not begin as an obvious 'mover and shaker' of people. Born in Shropshire in 1876, she grew up in Ellesmere, studied history at Lady Margaret Hall in Oxford, taught at Marlborough, and then resigned as she was not physically robust.

Eglantyne moved to live with her mother in Cambridge, and it would have been so easy to settle for a life of peaceful obscurity. But she was a Christian, and at Oxford she had developed a passion for social concerns, so this compassion now drove her to take action.

She began in 1906 by publishing research on the poverty she'd found in Cambridge. Then in 1912 the Balkan Wars broke out, and Eglantyne left Cambridge for Macedonia. Her months among the refugees led her to decide that long-term constructive aid was more effective than short-term handouts. The First World War left Eglantyne horrified by the prolonged Allied blockade on Germany and Austria-Hungary, which even after Armistice meant starvation for millions of civilians, especially children.

And so, in 1919 Eglantyne and her sister Dorothy Buxton helped found the 'Fight the Famine' Council, which wanted to end the blockade and establish a League of Nations. One day during a rally in Trafalgar Square, Eglantyne was arrested for distributing a leaflet showing starving children which read: "Our blockade has caused this – millions of children are starving to death."

She ended up in court and was fined, but the judge was so impressed with Eglantyne's commitment to children that he himself paid her fine. His money became the first donation to Save the Children, the new charity just set up by Eglantyne and Dorothy.

Save the Children was officially launched at the Albert Hall in May 1919, with the aim of helping the starving civilians of central Europe. It was a success, raising £400,000 in that first year alone. When in the autumn of 1921 Russia was facing famine, Save the Children chartered a cargo ship, the SS Torcello, to carry 600 tons of lifesaving food and medical supplies to Russia – saving hundreds of thousands of lives.

By 1922 Save the Children had become one of Britain's biggest charities. Eglantyne Jebb's Declaration of the Rights of the Child, written in 1923, was adopted by the League of Nations the following year. The present-day UN Convention on the Rights of the Child is derived from it.

But ten years of running Save the Children had sapped Eglantyne's fragile strength, and she died in Geneva in 1928, aged only 52.



#### What would you like for Christmas?

If you have nothing much going for you, Antony Pucci (1819-92) should be your patron saint. He came from nowhere – a peasant family in Tuscany. He went nowhere – he spent his life as a parish priest in the Tuscan city of Viareggio. He was unattractive to look at. He wasn't good with words – people found him awkward and shy.

So why do people still remember him today? Because Antony Pucci used the one gift he did have in the service of others. He was an excellent organiser, and he served his people brilliantly. His care for the sick in the epidemics of 1854 and 1866 was outstanding. He even set up the first seaside nursing homes for poorly children.

Antony Pucci used to say that organisation is the servant of charity, not its substitute. But he used his gift for organisation as a way of showing his charity, and for that he was loved.

So – if your family is nothing to shout about, if you wince when you look in the mirror in the morning, if you stand tongue-tied in most social situations, don't despair. Ask God to show you what gift He HAS given you and use it in the service of others. And in giving to them, you will receive! It is when we lose our lives for His sake, in His service, that we truly find them.

### **Cycle of Prayer**
